TRAVEL TO THE UNIVERSITY OF ESSEX

(Full travel instructions will be included in the Registration documents)

The University is situated three miles from COLCHESTER, in Essex, 50 miles North East of London.

Air

STANSTED is the nearest airport, some 45 minutes by road from Colchester - an excellent, new, pleasant airport with direct scheduled flights from many other European countries: Austria, Belgium, the Czech Republic, Denmark, Holland, Germany, Finland, France, Ireland, Italy, Northern Ireland, Romania, Russia, Spain, Scotland and Switzerland. London HEATHROW and London GATWICK airports are some 90 minutes by taxi from the University, or take underground railway (Heathrow) or train (Gatwick) to London, Liverpool Street station.

Train

There is an excellent rail service between Colchester and London (Liverpool Street) with a journey time of 50 minutes to an hour and 3 trains an hour. The University is 3 miles from Colchester Station - 15 minutes by taxi. There are also bus connections and a mini-bus service will be provided on days 0 and 1.

Road

The University is just off the A12 and 40 minutes drive from the M25. Parking out of term time, when the Conference will take place, is ample. The journey from the Channel tunnel at Folkestone takes about two hours by car, via the M20, M25 and A12.

Ship

The University is 14 miles from Harwich port where ships sail to the Hook of Holland. It is a little under two hours drive from Dover.

THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMME

In addition there will be round-table sessions on topics such as researching children, ageing and Social Europe. There will be opportunities to meet authors who have recently published works on Europe. There will be information sessions on areas such as sociology on the Internet, European research funding, panel surveys and data archives.

The programme will include social and cultural events. There will be a Publishers display and Reception, a University Reception and a Conference Dinner on Wednesday night. The ESA will be holding its Annual General Meeting during the Conference. You can also book rooms for special meetings (form enclosed or available from Conference organiser).

UNIVERSITY OF ESSEX

The University of Essex is a leading academic institution in the UK particularly renowned for its strong social sciences departments. The Department of Sociology which is hosting the Conference is one of the largest Sociology departments in the UK with a national and international reputation. The University has three major projects funded by the UK Economic and Social Research Council: the Research Centre on Micro-Social Change, the Data Archive and the Qualitative Data Archival Resource Centre.
